Gateway to Prevention & Recovery, Inc. evolved from a town meeting in 1983. More than 300 local people attended a Chemical People event addressing youth use of alcohol and other drugs. It was decided to incorporate as a not-for-profit corporation in 1984 by a smaller group of volunteers and this group manned an office until enough funds were secured to hire professional staff in 1985.

Our mission has stayed the course and we have been blessed to grow these past 29 years. I am looking forward to the next dimension of progress as we have a Medical Director leading our medically assisted treatment in FY15 and we together, prevention and clinical, continue the course of wellness and health.

I am very proud of our staff who deliver the prevention services in six counties and the clinical staff who serve the addicts and their families in four sites. 42% of our staff have been with Gateway for over 5 years and 19% for over 10 years or more. You will meet them in this report and you will then understand why I am so proud. It is an honor to work beside them.

LETTER FROM THE BOARD CHAIR

The last four years have been fraught with change for the health and behavioral health systems. While many providers have found themselves in reduced financial circumstances, been taken over, or failed, Gateway has continued steady growth and positioned itself in some key ways to provide more, more varied, and better quality services in the near future. And it has done this while maintaining fairly good local control of the kind of services our community needs, and of the directions we want to go in the future, despite the fact that recent federally driven health-care changes have tended to create loss of local control of services.

A major accomplishment is the enhanced provider status Gateway achieved this fall which will allow expanded services and billing. Another is increased ties and coordination with other providers locally and statewide. Finally, looking to the future, I think there are three keys to success for Gateway:

- Continue to provide quality services with well qualified staff, and indeed continuously improve quality.
- Begin to combine prevention and treatment services. Gateway has long been a known leader in prevention services and this should provide an advantage in successfully linking prevention, intervention and treatment, especially at younger ages.
- Gateway needs to remain in close contact with the communities it serves as well as develop effective contractual relationships with State and national groups.

Recruiting and keeping good Board members will be a key to the near future success of Gateway, as well as an innovative and flexible management team and quality staff. If you are interested in Gateway's mission, I encourage to contact one of the Board members or the CEO about serving on the Board or in some other capacity.

Mental health and addiction problems in our community, as all across the country, are increasing, not decreasing. We have greater need than ever for quality, timely services. We are fortunate to have a grass-roots, not-for-profit corporation like Gateway to "help people and communities help themselves."

Gateway to Prevention & Recovery provides health and wellness through its clinical recovery sites and through its prevention sites. Our name was chosen to reflect that we not only want to treat addiction and abuse but we choose to work just as hard to prevent these from happening.

The following data is from our clinical recovery sites:

First time patients have several hours each workday to walk in to receive services.

All patients in Shawnee, Stillwater, and Chandler at time of addiction severity assessment are screened for gambling, co-occurring disorders, and trauma. Of the 1,572 patients receiving clinical services in FY 14, 35% were employed (full time and/or part time), 15% were married, and 46% never married. The drugs of choice for clients were amphetamine followed by marijuana, alcohol, and opioids. A total of 39,428 hours were provided by clinical staff through individual, family, education, or group sessions.

Gateway also serves the offenders at Mabel Bassett Correctional Center in McLoud. 123 ladies received services in this six month program.

The next few pages will give more detail about the clinical services, and behavioral health & wellness prevention services follows. General agency information will complete the annual report.

Gateway has expanded services to the schools through it's involvement with the Child Welfare Collaborative of Pottawatomie County. Education and training on substance disorders are provided for the community, employers and referral sources as well as offering EAP services.

Adolescent Services

EXPECT HOPE

As a part of the Southern Pottawatomie County Child Welfare Stake-Holders Collaborative, Gateway provides adolescent counselors to “Partners In Caring”, a school and community based multi-disciplinary health team that provides services to Asher, Macomb, Maud, and Wanette Public Schools.

As a contracting agency with the Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse, Gateway provides services to youth and adolescents at no cost.

Future goals of the Adolescent Treatment Team include:

- Intensive Outpatient Program
- Expansion of services into other school districts
- Provide urinalysis testing to youth and adolescents
- Education group on Parent-Teen interaction, communication, and problem-solving skills
- Tobacco education groups
- Expand services for families to address enabling behaviors and family dynamics in addiction

The Gateway Adolescent Treatment Team offers clinical counseling to youth and adolescents in both an agency-based and school-based setting. Services provided include:

- Assessment and identification substance use disorders.
- Substance abuse education and prevention
- Treatment for substance abuse and co-occurring disorders
- Individual, family and parent-sibling counseling
- Group therapy
- Parent-Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT)
- Partner with Office of Juvenile Affairs to assess and treat court-referred youth and adolescents

In a partnership with Shawnee Public Schools, the Adolescent Treatment Team provides counseling for the Student Assistance Program (SAP) at Shawnee High School and Middle School to help students:

- Gain knowledge and insight to the dangers and negative effects of unhealthy behaviors including substance abuse and tobacco and nicotine use
- Encourage and promote healthy lifestyle choices
- Give the student tools needed to have good decision-making skills
- Improve impulse control and problem-solving skills
- Encourage standing up to peer pressure
- Help managing anger in a healthy manner

Chandler Clinic

Gateway to Prevention and Recovery provides outpatient services for substance disorders at our Chandler clinic. Services are provided for the Lincoln County Drug Court program, probation and parole, Department of Human Services TANF/ Child welfare programs, and referrals from a variety of other sources as well as self referrals.

- Services provided Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday.
- Group services both morning and evening hours.
- Assessments, case management, individual therapy
- Group services include relapse prevention, anger management, parenting, and domestic violence classes.
- ADSAC (DUI) assessments; Saturday by appointment.

Providing direct treatment to the Chandler area and Lincoln County as a whole is essential. Many patients early in treatment do not have the necessary resources to travel to Shawnee for services. It is rare and unique for rural areas to have addiction treatment facilities with so many different services, and Gateway is proud to be able to offer the array of services with a fully licensed staff.

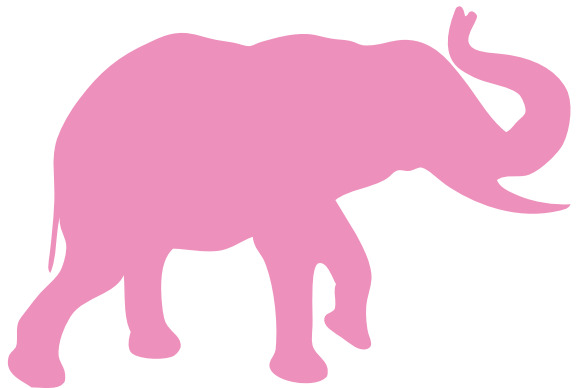


Underage Drinking

EXPECT HOPE

The Regional Prevention Center continued through 2014 to work on the challenge of underage drinking in our region.

The Shawnee Police Department is holding safety patrols on a regular basis and has agreed to set up their patrols on nights that teens are more likely to be driving after drinking (Prom, Graduation, after home football games).



Alcohol Compliance Checks were done in cooperation with area law enforcement professionals using youth from the local 2Much2Lose Club as decoys to make alcohol buys in local grocery stores, convenience stores and restaurants.

An effort to push information on the Social Host Law out into the Shawnee Area is underway. The Regional Prevention Coordinator is working with the Shawnee Youth Coalition to put the Pink Elephant and the Red Solo Cup into the public eye to warn adults not to provide a place for kids to drink alcohol.

Prevention of Meth Use *EXPECT HOPE*



The Regional Prevention Center continued through 2014 to work on the challenge of meth use in Okfuskee County. Because of a lack of evidence about why it is a problem in that particular county, implementation was delayed for three years while more assessment was done.

2014 marked the year that the assessment was finished and the first Meth Workgroup meeting began.



The first event was a Town Hall Meeting on Meth Prevention held in December of 2014 in Okemah. This was the first of many education events that will be held throughout Okfuskee County in 2015.

Prevention of Prescription Drug Misuse

EXPECT HOPE



In 2011, Gateway to Prevention and Recovery, received a 4 year Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Strategic Prevention Framework State Incentive Grant (SPF SIG) to address the problem of non-medical use of prescription (Rx) drugs in Pottawatomie County.

Factors identified as influencing the non-medical use of Rx drugs in Pott. County were easy access to prescription drugs. The target population were individuals residing in Pott. County between the ages of 18-70. Strategies chosen to address the issue include policies, enforcement, media advocacy and distribution of lock boxes. Purchased medication lock boxes are distributed at local senior health fairs, assisted living centers, hospitals, hospice/home health agencies, pharmacies, hospitals, and agencies providing services to individuals with disabilities.

Additional prevention includes:

- Keep all pain medications in a locked storage container to avoid theft and access to others.
 - Take medications as prescribed
 - Never share or sell prescription drugs
- Properly dispose of unused, or expired drugs

Gateway and their Prevention staff have gained a credible reputation in the field for providing strong technical assistance and consultation for policy and wellness plan development over the past 10 years. July 2014 – June 2015 will be the final year of the Communities of Excellence Tobacco Prevention and Control Grantees.

In the coming year new wellness grants will be offered through a competitive Request for Proposal, RFP, process. Our coalitions look forward to the new challenge and anticipate submission of proposals that will continue and expand services in tobacco control, fitness, and nutrition for Pottawatomie, Seminole, Lincoln, Hughes, Okfuskee and McIntosh counties.

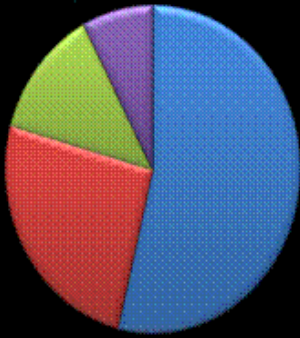

Reviews, Audits, and Contracts

EXPECT HOPE



All of the programs received positive reviews and program audits in fiscal year ending June, 2014. Gateway's three year certification from OK Department of Mental Health (DMHSAS) renewal was combined with the application as Comprehensive Community Addiction Recovery Center (CCARC) for the three counties of Pottawatomie, Lincoln, and Payne through March, 2015.

A favorable financial year-end audit was received from Finley & Cook, CPA's. Gateway provides for the three counties served through various state contracts from OK DMHSAS, OK Health Care Authority, OK Department of Human Services, OK Department of Corrections, Shawnee Public Schools, United Way, and OK Tobacco Settlement Endowment Trust and was the recipient of Avedis Foundation grant in FY14. Gateway is a provider for Pottawatomie and Lincoln county Drug Courts.

Other sources of income are fees for specialized workshops, training, and Employee Assistance Programs (EAP). Patients receiving clinical services are charged fees based on ability to pay and are not refused services if unable to pay. The majority of the patients fees were adjusted because of family income and size. Funding for FY14 was primarily from government sources as indicated in the chart. Gateway was successful in getting on the major OK private insurance panel as a provider.

The professional staff of Gateway is the key to providing quality services. All staff who deliver clinical services are licensed counselors or in the process of being licensed or certified. These include Licensed Professional Counselor, LPC; Licensed Marital & Family Therapist, LMFT; Licensed Alcohol Drug Counselor, LADC, and Certified Alcohol Drug Counselor (CADC) plus certified case managers. Prevention staff members are Certified Prevention Specialists CPS or in the process of being certified. All staff have been specially trained in addiction through their education and supervised experience and continue to further their knowledge and skills through ongoing education and training to stay current on best practices. Gateway is recognized for its professional contribution and dedication to improving the quality of treatment and prevention.

Gateway's international accreditation (valid through May, 2015) is CARF, Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities and is for the clinical sites in Shawnee, Chandler and Stillwater as Integrated Services Programs: Outpatient Treatment for Adults and Children and Adolescents. The prevention department was accredited for prevention for children and adolescents.
